Painted with diamonds, drawn with silver wire, jewelry is art to wear, as the growing number of contemporary artists who also create beautiful baubles can attest. And as interest in the current art scene rockets, these gems are suddenly in the spotlight.

At London's Ben Brown Fine Arts this month, jewelry dealer Louisa Guinness is exhibiting British sculptor Marc Quinn's diamond-studded white-gold pendant, cast in the shape of a life-sized strawberry. The \$50,000 piece of fruit takes top billing in Guinness's exhibition "Small Sculpture to Wear" (November 20 through December 20), which will include new works from Anish Kapoor, Michael Craig-Martin and Ron Arad as well. And next month in New York, at the soon-to-open Salon 94 Freeman, "The Crown Jewels" (December 12 through January 5) will feature

> glittering stocking stuffers from Kiki Smith and Paula Hayes, among others.

On February 23, Palm Beach's Norton Museum of Art opens a show of the same name (through June 15), devoted to a man so besotted by jewelry that as a child of eight he'd already created copper-wire treasures for his sister's dolls.
